Collegiate rodeo is Fresno State's longest running club sport; a rodeo has been held every year since 1949. The team's 45 student-athletes are successful in the rodeo arena and in the classroom. Several are recognized every year as Scholar Americans by the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association for having a 3.5 GPA or higher. These student-athletes are highly sought after by industry for their leadership, teamwork and problem solving skills.



WINNING RESULTS

The Fresno State Bulldoggers Rodeo Team saddled up for success this year! Although the rodeo season was cut short due to COVID-19, both the men's and women's teams were on track to rank in the top three for the West Coast Region. Similarly, both teams were preparing to compete in the College National Finals Rodeo, looking to make their second collective appearance in the University's 70-year rodeo history.

Despite the challenges of this season, the team standings and individual placings of student-athletes continue to rise. Team members consistently placed in the top positions in their competitions, and both the men's and women's teams had stand-out performances.

Rylee George, an agricultural business student who competes in team roping and breakaway roping, had just won women's all-around and was taking a commanding lead for the women's team. Reed Neely, an agricultural education and agricultural communication student who competes in saddle bronc riding, finished all except one competition in first or second place, leading the way for the men's team.

It's been an unprecedented year for these student-athletes but with the dedication of Head Coach Uhuru Adem, the team has continued to reach new heights and remain focused throughout the uncertainty.

Coach Adem is "Bulldog born and Bulldog bred" himself. He competed as a Bulldogger in 2013-14 and received his agricultural business degree from Fresno State in 2015.
